"The [Caribbean] islands are somewhat limited with diagnostics," said Dr. Diego. "Miami is the gateway for Latin America and the Caribbean. It's good for them to have an institution that will streamline things and offer the latest innovative cardiac care available."

"The mainstay of the practice remains hypertension and cholesterol management, with emphasis on cardiovascular event prevention" said Dr. Diego, who has practiced medicine in the Miami area for 27 years and worked previously as a staff cardiologist at Baptist Hospital in Miami, South Miami Hospital and Kendall Regional Hospital, among

The American Heart Association (AHA) and the American College of Cardiology announced a new hypertension guideline Nov. 13. According to the AHA's Hypertension journal, the new guideline calls for high blood pressure to be treated with lifestyle changes and medication beginning at 130/80 rather than the previous threshold of 140/90. That means 46 percent of the U.S. population will be categorized

as hypertensive, compared to 32 percent before.

Dr. Diego sees heart failure patients, and conducts nuclear diagnostic testing to assess heart function as well as risks of heart attacks and blocked coronary arteries.

"The goal is to avoid the [cardiac] event from taking place. Our approach risk stratifies patients-and we strive for normality management of cardiovascular diseases. The realm of cardiac intervention changed dramatically over the years. Bypass surgery is now uncommon compared to before. The complexity of valve surgical intervention has been simplified and the arrhythmia management has been revolutionized. This translates into giving patient's a quality of life. Prolonging life expectancy, while maintaining quality of life, is the bottom line."

Treatment is covered by most HMO insurance plans.

Word of mouth continues to be the primary means behind the growth of the practice, Dr. Diego said.

"We have reached the point that the biggest referral source is our patients. That shows we are doing a good job. The referring physician has to feel comfortable that you assessed the patient correctly then took the time to discuss it with them. This allows the referring physician to help

the patient follow the plan that was instituted for them."

The practice fully implemented an EMR system ahead of federal mandates.

Its system, IMS has been approved by the Certification Commission for Healthcare Information Technology (CCHIT®), a certifying body recognized by the federal government.

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The clinic's Echocardiogram Laboratory was also granted accreditation by The Intersocietal Commission for the Accreditation of Echocardiography Laboratories.

Among its many endeavors, Cardiology Healthcare handles the cardiology management for Florida International University's athletic department.

Services provided at its state-ofthe-art center include arrhythmia diagnosis and management; comprehensive cardiovascular evaluation; hypertensive management; and pacemaker management.

Diagnostic testing at the facility covers a wide range of the latest technology and procedures such as 2D Echocardiogram w/Doppler, around-the-clock cardiac monitoring, Electrocardiogram, Stress testing, nuclear cardiovascular testing, Vascular Studies, Pacemaker interrogation and much more.

For out-of-towners, Dr. Diego conducts virtual consultations before patients travel to Miami for an evaluation, saving them time and money. Cardiovascular evaluations are typically completed in one to two days.
